MAYORS REPORT

It is difficult to accept that a new financial year has arrived. It of course follows, that Council has completed the annual budgeting process, which includes setting the Rates and Charges for 2021/22.

Ratepayers will recall that in recognition of the challenges and difficulties associated with the COVID-19 pandemic, Council adopted a 0% increase in the General Rate for the 2020/21 period. A similar Zero percentage increase in the General Rate has also been adopted this financial year, however, it has been necessary to increase the standard Waste Management Charge levied on all properties, plus the annual charge for the household collection service (if this service is provided to your property).

These increases are required as a result of higher costs associated with the transport and disposal of waste at landfill; the substantial increase in the 'gate charges' for deposit of recyclables; and the need to achieve full cost recovery for the Waste Management Program. In the past, a certain amount has been subsidised by the General Rate and from a policy perspective, Council was keen to eliminate this cross subsidy.

In terms of the General Rate, it should be noted that whilst Council has not changed the number of cents to be charged in each dollar of the Assessed Annual Value', the amount payable by individual properties may vary depending on the classification (e.g. Primary Production; Residential; Commercial etc.). These variations are due to the introduction of differential rating in 2019/20, which was necessary following the issue of adjustment factors to the Assessed Annual Values by the Valuer-General which took effect from 1st July 2019. In the absence of introducing differential rating, substantial increases would have been imposed on the owners of both Primary Production and Residential properties. The adjustments made in 2021/22 is aimed at minimising the level of differentiation between classifications prior to the receipt of fresh property valuations which will take affect from 1 July 2022.

In regard to the 2021/22 Budget, total income for the year is estimated to be \$14.60 million, which includes an estimated \$3.06 million in Capital Grants. Total operating expenditure is approximately \$12.0 million (includes \$3 million for asset depreciation). Some \$7.5 million (not including carry forward projects) is allocated for Capital Works projects and these are listed as a separate Item in this Newsletter.

Oatlands Bargain Centre

At the time of writing this Newsletter item, I have been informed that the Oatlands Bargain Centre has just

distributed the profits from its 2020/21 trading activities. This organisation is totally managed and operated by volunteers and profits are distributed based on the number of hours dedicated by each volunteer and the organisation that is nominated by each volunteer to benefit from their input. A total of \$28,893.28 was distributed to 11 different organisations. Total volunteer hours worked was 2,475, meaning that each volunteer hour was valued at \$11.67 per hour. What a magnificent achievement by this dedicated group of volunteers.

Covid-19

I would like to take this opportunity to acknowledge and thank the community for its strong, active response to the COVID-19 Vaccination Program. One cannot overstate the importance of supporting this critical public health initiative. I also thank everyone for continuing to maintain safe hygiene and social distancing measures. I encourage everyone to maintain vigilance in combating this virus that is currently ravaging many communities elsewhere in Australia, and of course, overseas.

Council at work in the Community

Oatlands Aquatic Centre

The Oatlands Aquatic Centre is progressing at a steady pace and we are still on target for Practical Completion on the 4th March 2022.

Over recent weeks there has been a concrete pour of in excess of 73m³ and the structural steel has been erected to frame the entry roof structures. Over the coming weeks, more structural steel will be delivered and erected, large structural wall panels will be delivered on site, then comes the roof panels, followed by the roof cladding.

Council's David Richardson, Manager Infrastructure & Work, Craig Whatley, Senior Works Coordinator are preparing with the Council Team to start the stormwater construction works, followed by the carpark construction, then the landscaping.

In addition to these works, the subdivision of a parcel of land at the rear of the site which fronts South Parade has received its Planning Permit, with services about to be installed. The design for the reconstruction of South Parade is nearing completion to enable the construction works to be completed by the Council team to coincide with the Practical Completion of the Oatlands Aquatic Centre.

Kempton's Victoria War Memorial Hall

Funding from the Australian Government has played a major role in the refurbishment of the Hall. The Kempton Streetscape Committee has provided direction to project managers Maria Weeding and Helen Geard for the development of this project. It combines the efforts of Works Coordinator Paul Lang and his Kempton field workforce team, along with the artisans from Heritage Building Solutions Pty Ltd, undertaking the building works for the Project. The sensitively designed external seating, the portico, the universal access and the paved area all provide an elegant transformation to this well-loved 'Grand Old Lady' in the centre of the Village. There is a very strong theme & connection through the Village, between the partially completed Memorial Park which is on land generously gifted to Council by Tim and Tania Hoskinson, then across to Memorial Avenue, then to the historic WW1 Memorial Arch in front of the Council Chambers and then culminating at the Victoria War Memorial Hall, where the Sub Branch of the RSL is integral to the Hall. These strong connections reinforce the amazing sense of Community at times of adversity and how the Community comes together

to support our way of life. The Hall is the centre of that Community spirit and it is appropriate that we recognise that this "Grand Old Lady' has played a major role in the health and wellbeing of the Green Ponds Community over many, many years and it is time for us to rejuvenate her and provide the accoutrements that reinforce that well-earned grandeur.

It is also acknowledged that funding to bring the Memorial Arch Clock back to its former glory is also underway.



Oatlands Underground Power Project

This project was developed for the undergrounding of the overhead power lines around the Oatlands Historic Precinct, along the Esplanade and Barrack Street in Oatlands. It was made possible through a major grant from the Australian Government, with Council contributing funding from its capital works program to the construction of the Project. The Project comprises Stages 1, 2 and 3. Stage 1 was from the entrance to Callington Mill on the Esplanade to the junction of Barrack Street. Stage 2 was from the end of Stage 1 to the junction of Barrack Street and Mason Street. Stage 3 will be commencing shortly to encapsulate the balance of Barrack Street and most of Mason Street.

There is certainly a noticeable difference to the amenity of the streetscape when you look at 'before and after' images. Stage 2 completed is shown in the image below and the yet to start, Stage 3 is shown alongside. It isn't until the poles and wires are removed that you realise this 'clutter in the fabric of the streetscape'. Energy supply is crucial to our way of life in a village and with this Project we will deliver the best of both worlds. With the Australian Government's and TasNetworks support, Council works Team of former Manager Infrastructure & Works, Jack Lyall, Senior Works Coordinator Craig Whatley and the Oatlands crew it has been a wonderful Project that shows how Federal Government, State Government and Local Government can deliver amazing, high quality Projects that add significant value to the day-to-day environment that we live in, as well as expand the visitor experience in this unique historic village of ours. Well done to the Team with the Project to date, when Stage 3 is completed this will be a credit to all who have been involved

Campania Consultation

In 2015 Council, in conjunction with the local community, undertook a substantial project to create a Structure Plan for the township of Campania. This set a number of strategies and initiatives in place for the town, for example; the parameters for the future development of the former school farm and the (recently funded and soon to be implemented) improvements to the car park and bus stop facility near the corner of Climie Street and Reeve Street.

Another initiative was the idea of Council subdividing land on the southern side of Native Corners Road, above Water Lane, with the net sale proceeds being used to fund improvements in the town. Plans for the subdivision of the land have progressed to draft stage by Council officers with input from Council's consultant engineer and surveyor.

In addition to the possible subdivision, the recent major upgrade of the accessible walkway in the bush reserve, which was made possible by a grant funded by the Australian Government has created a higher level of interest in the area. Also, there is potential need to improve the cemetery and columbarium. There have also been calls from some members of the community for an off-lead dog space in the area.

All the above mentioned issues were combined into a draft 'master plan' for the area for the purposes of community consultation. On 12 May 2021, a 'drop-in session' was held at the Memorial Hall from 2:00pm to 7:00pm. Approximately 34 members of the community attended. Feedback can be summarised as quite positive and supportive (detailed information is included in the Council

Frequently asked question: Do I need a building permit?

You do not need a permit or approval for low risk work, however you may require planning approval. ... High risk work (permit work) involves commercial, industrial or public buildings and residential buildings that require a planning permit, as well as owner builder work and most works in hazardous areas.

Information for Dog Owners & Dog Walkers



Dog owners and walkers enjoy numerous health and social benefits by walking their dogs and a regular walk is vitally important for your pet's health too.

Unfortunately, there are a small number of dog owners who are not cleaning up after their dogs. Poo is simply being left on the ground for people to view or accidentally step into it.

Council has installed a number of 'Dog Poo Waste Bag dispensers and bins in various locations and people are strongly encouraged to use these.

In addition, it is planned to install additional dispensers and bins in key locations where there is regular dog walking activities

Should you be aware of a location where a 'Dog Poo Waste Bag' dispenser and bin is warranted, please contact Council's Animal Control Officer (Rachel Collis) on 62 545054 during office hours and the aim is to install these over a period of time.

Note:

- ♦ Should you find a 'Dog Poo Waste Bag' dispenser that is empty, please notify the Council on the same number.
- ◆ It is an offence under the Dog Control Act 2000 not to immediately remove and dispose of any faeces left by a dog in a public place or in a place not owned, or leased, by the person.

Realignment of Bluff Road Junction with Elderslie Road

Responding to community representations, Council sought funding through the Australian Government's road safety Black Spot Program for a grant to enable these concerns to be addressed. There were a range of factors that supported the works: - the junction of Bluff Road and Elderslie Road provided a very challenging exit path for vehicles leaving Bluff Road; - ten to twelve school students waiting for the school bus on the edge of a verge; - and the location of the community letter box was also a significant safety issue.

This was initially raised by the Broadmarsh & Elderslie Progress Association and supported by a number of residents of Bluff Road.


Officers from the State Department of State Growth were also very supportive of the grant application which resulted in the grants funds being allocated and works are well under way.

A Bus Shelter donated by the Brighton Rotary Club will also be installed at this location.
