A new purpose-built Aquatic Centre for the region will now become a reality with the Southern Midlands Council deciding to progress to construction phase. This project was identified some twenty plus years ago in recognition that the existing facility was nearing the end of its useful life.

The facility, to be built at Oatlands, will include a 25m, 6 lane pool, toddlers pool and dry activity exercise room. The total cost will be around \$9 million, of which Council has already secured \$4 million in grant funding from both the Australian and Tasmanian Governments. Council's contribution will come from the sale of existing property assets; a loan borrowing to reflect the long-term nature of the facility; and a contribution of \$80,000 from the previous Station Child Care Centre.

In making the decision, Council acknowledged the Centre is projected to require a significant operating subsidy, but the benefits to the community outweighed the cost impact.

Council has a 10-year financial strategy to absorb this cost, but it is hoped that as attendances increase and operational efficiencies are achieved, operational costs will decline. The cost impact is also softened by the fact the existing pool, which only operates for three months each year, requires a subsidy from Council of around \$120,000 and has reached the end of its useful life and is not able to be upgraded in the current location. The projected subsidy is commensurate with the increased quality of service and the fact that it will operate all year round.

Council is excited at the opportunity the new facility will bring, including health and well-being for all age groups, 'learn to swim' classes and swimming training for the municipalities' schools and their students and general recreation for residents and visitors. It will support the Oatlands Multi-Purpose Health Centre.

These benefits will be enjoyed by the community and visitors for decades to come.

As mentioned the centre will be open all-year round with the hours of operation to be determined by seasons, usage and public holidays.

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### Man issued infringement notice for dumping litter in Colebrook

Police have issued a man an infringement notice and fine for illegally dumping litter on the side of the road in Colebrook.

Following an investigation by Southern Midlands Council and Tasmania Police, a 27year-old Colebrook man was issued with an infringement notice for Depositing litter in a public place with a volume between 2 and 10 cubic metres, and fine of \$1,720.

It is alleged that between Saturday 14 November and Monday 16 of November the man dumped several small truckloads of garden and outdoor rubbish on the side of Yarlington Road, approximately 8kms from Colebrook.

Senior Sergeant Parker said that the information provided to Police and the Council in a very timely manner identifying the individual concerned, was greatly appreciated.

## Caves Track upgrade at Chauncy Vale

The latest work to improve the popular Caves Loop Walk at Chauncy Vale has just been completed. John Hughes Track Construction was engaged by Council to improve alignment, stabilise eroding edges and to make the route through the rocky landscape more obvious and user-friendly than it used to be. The Caves Loop track passes by Brown's Cave and several small caves providing access to one of the more dramatic and unique landscapes in the Southern Midlands.

Natural stone formations, views and wildflowers are some of the things to enjoy along the way. The Caves Loop Walk is 2.5 km long and usually takes a little over an hour to complete.

Brown's Caves was named after a bushranger named Brown who was known to hide from parties of troopers by climbing down into one of the least accessible caves in the escarpment to avoid capture.

New: Australian Warning System

The Australian Warning System is a new national approach to information and warnings for hazards like bushifire, flood, storm, cyclone, extreme heat and severe weather.

Early in December 2020 the first stage of the new Australian Warning System was rolled out.

The Changes include the way bushfire warnings are displayed on the TFS website and partner agencies, including <u>TasALERT</u> and ABC.



- From 1 December, the colours and icons (diamond to a triangle) have changed to:
  - Advice (yellow)
  - Watch and Act (orange)
  - Emergency Warning (red)

While the colours and icons have changed, the meanings of the levels have not, and incident controllers do not have to do anything differently when activating a warning level.

The changes are part of a nationwide review of the Australian Warning System. They are designed to bring consistency across Australia to the way incidents are displayed, with most states and territories having worked towards implementing them in December 2020.

In 2021, further changes will be introduced, including changes to warning messages and calls to action.

## Callington Park Oatlands – playground officially opened



On Monday 14 December 2020 Senator Claire Chandler and Mayor Alex Green officially opened the playground with assistance from Oatlands District High School students. Many of the students present were involved in

selecting the playground equipment installed at the Park. The opening was also attended by community members and the Lake Dulverton and Callington Park Management Committee.

The playground equipment has been available for use since September 2020, however the Callington Park grass area has been closed until recently due to installation of an irrigation system and the establishment of new turf.

There have been hundreds of children (and adults!) enjoying the new equipment and lots of positive feedback has been received. Council thanks the Australian Government for supporting this project with funding from the Community Development Grants Program.

### Frequently ask question about new building work Can I build an addition, verandah, deck to my dwelling without a permit?

In most cases **this type of work** is Category 3 – Notifiable Building Work and the owner must engage a building surveyor to ensure approvals are in place before the work starts. A copy of the Certificate of Likely Compliance – Notifiable Work and detailed plans issued by the Building Surveyor must be lodged with Council before the work starts.

- It's a good idea to talk to your Building Designer or Building Surveyor first for clarification.
- What happens when building work is carried out without approvals in place?
- Council would be required under legislation to issue a Building Notice and a Building Order to the owner to obtain approval under the Act;
- Selling your property: the owner is required by law to ensure that all building and plumbing work has been carried out in accordance with legislation, failure to obtain a Certificate of Completion or illegal work may make a <u>contract of sale invalid</u>:
  <u>I.e. Vendor Requisition</u> Has any building work, improvements or renovations been carried out on the property on the land for sale? If so, the date the building work was issued and a Certificate of Completion, Occupancy Permit may need to be provided?
- Your insurance company may refuse future claims.

# SWIMMING POOL INFORMATION: Drowning happens quickly and silently

The National Construction Code of Australia (NCA) defines a swimming pool as an excavation or structure that:

- is capable of being filled with water to a depth of 300 millimetres or more the maximum possible water surface is greater than 5 square metres.
- is capable of being used for swimming, bathing, wading, paddling or other human aquatic activities.
- is used, designed, manufactured or adapted for the purpose mentioned above, despite its current use includes spas and inflatable swimming pools.

### It does not include a:

- fish pond, ornamental pond, manufactured to be used for ornamental purposes.
- dam used for aquaculture, marine research or storage of water.
- Watercourse.
- Spa bath situated in a bathroom which is not continually filled with water.
- Birthing pool used solely for water births.
- Portable wading pool.
- A portable wading pool is defined as: capable of being filled with water to a depth of less than 300 millimetres;

and has a volume of no more than 2,000 litres; and has no filtration or pumping System.

### Basic Swimming Pool Requirements :

- Fences and gates must be at least 1.2m high, with a bottom clearance of no more than 100mm. Any horizontal rails should be on the side of the fence and at least 900mm apart. Any vertical rails must not be more than 100mm apart.
- Gates must only open outwards and must automatically close and lock.
- The gate latch must be at least 1.5m above the ground otherwise special conditions may apply.
- Boundary fences cannot be used as part of the pool enclosure, unless certified by your Building Surveyor.
- Doors leading into the pool must be self-closing and selflocking, and the release latch at least 1.5m above the floor and must not swing into the pool area. This does not include sliding doors.
- Windows overlooking the pool area must be either totally .
- covered by bars no more than 100mm apart, or not be able to be opened more than 105mm by the use of chains etc.
- Remove any temporary or non-compliant ladders or equipment that can be used to climb and access pool area.

Inspections of properties are underway, and where considered necessary, Fire Abatements Notices will be issued for the clearing of the fire hazards in accordance with the *Local Government 1993*.

Failure to comply with a Fire Hazard Abatement Notice may result in council undertaking the work at the property owner's expense and fines may apply. Council seeks the co-operation of residents in ensuring that their property does not constitute a fire risk during the coming months.
