It is pleasing to see an unprecedented amount of activity throughout the Southern Midlands. For our farming communities we are witnessing one of the best harvests for decades, and an excellent season for our graziers

and fat lamb producers. As I write the fruit harvest is coming to an end, and the grape harvest about to commence. Echoing the activity on the land is the heightened activity in our townships and villages. A huge amount of activity is taking place, particularly in residential and commercial development.

In Campania the Southern Midlands largest land

development is rapidly progressing ready for new home builders. From Bagdad, Campania, Kempton, through to Oatlands, there are many new homes and projects underway.

The new distillery in Oatlands has taken shape, and we are all looking forward to it's opening in several months time. Your Council recently hosted representatives of the Commonwealth and State Governments, Senator Chandler and the Hon Jane Howlett MLC respectively, for a turning-thesod ceremony to mark the commencement of construction of the new Oatlands Aquatic Centre. VOS Builders, a Tasmania Civil Contracting Company who was awarded the \$7.7m construction contract, has started work, and we look forward to seeing the former works depot site transformed over the next 12 months.



At the February Council meeting at Tunbridge, the Council formally recognised and thanked one of our local doctors

who has recently retired. Dr Myrle Gray AM retired in late 2020 after 38 years service to Tasmania as a GP. Starting in 1984, Dr Gray worked continually in the Midlands initially at Oatlands and later Campbell Town. Dr Gray was the founding patron of the MMPHC Auxiliary, a wonderful community organisation tirelessly raising funds for the Midlands Multi-Purpose Health Centre. In recognition of Dr Gray's contribution to rural medicine she was made a Member of the Order of Australia in 2018. On behalf of the Southern Midlands and broader Midlands community I would like to extend our thanks to Dr Gray for her tireless work and service.

Turning the first sod for construction of the Oatlands Aquatic Centre

The much-anticipated Oatlands Aquatic Centre reached an important milestone today with the start of earthworks – the first step in the construction process for the purposebuilt facility for the Southern Midlands community. Representatives from the three tiers of Government who provided funding towards this exciting project were all on hand to see work start.

Senator Claire Chandler, representing the Australian Government (\$2 million contribution); Minister Jane Howlett, representing the Tasmanian Government (\$2 million contribution); Alli McShane, representing the former Station Child Care Centre (\$80,000 contribution) and Southern Midlands' Mayor Alex Green.

The construction is expected to be completed early next year (2022).

PROTECTING WATERWAYS AND DAMS FROM THE THREAT OF CUMBUNGI

Cumbungi or Bullrush (*Typha latifolia*) is an introduced weed that can invade lakes, waterways and wetlands throughout Tasmania, mainland states and overseas. It loves slow moving water up to two meters deep with high nutrient levels and lack of shade. The dense stands and rapid growth of cumbungi make it is one of the most troublesome of the emergent aquatic weeds, causing restricted water flow and siltation. Decaying top growth can lead to anaerobic (no oxygen) conditions which foul the water and reduce water quality impacting the general aquatic habitat, including invertebrates and fish.



If you have a dam or wet area with cumbungi on your property please be proactive and at least prevent seeding this year by cutting off, bagging and safely disposing of the seed heads.

For more permanent removal, cutting the stems off at least 15cm below water level will cause the plant to decay.

Caution needs to be exercised using chemicals around waterways. Please read the label and seek professional advice if you intend to spray to control cumbungi

Extract Owner Builder Work

Building or renovating without hiring a builder – Low Risk Work

There is a category of work called "Low Risk Work by an owner". This type of work does not require an Owner Builder Permit.

This category has no formal building approvals and does not need a licensed builder, but its scope is

limited. Examples of work in this category are:

- repairs to habitable buildings
- small outbuildings, garages, sheds (domestic or commercial) maximum size 36m² floor area (prefabricated) and a maximum size of 18m (nonprefabricated).
- Class 7b farm sheds (land used for primarily farming production—this does not include land used for hobby farming)

Who can do this work?

The land owner, or anyone hired to do work including tradespersons – no Owner Builder Permit required.

Owner building a bigger shed/ garage than allowed as Low Risk Work, or owner considering building a retaining wall or pool

This includes:

- a non-prefabricated shed greater than 18m and a storage shed or garage greater than 36m
- Class 7b farm shed
- Class 10 retaining wall
- Class 10 swimming pool

Before starting owner builder work

Other types of Building Work and Demolition Work ie Building a new home or adding a new room to an existing home would fall under the *Building Act 2016* as either:

- Category 3 Notifiable Work or
- Category 4 Permit Work

Walking Path—Broadmarsh

Council were successful in gaining funding support from the Australia Government for the Broadmarsh Village walking path. This was a project that was a high priority for the Broadmarsh and Elderslie Progress Association. Currently it is work in progress, with contractors WWTas Pty Ltd, through Bruce and Michael Whelan. This project will made a significant difference to the Village streetscape and provide safe access to the Community Hall, including a footbridge over Stoneyhurst Creek for the residents of the Village. There are yet to be constructed traffic calming islands at each end of the Village precinct, with hopefully a reduction of the speed limit down to 50kph through the Village. Council have also designed some additional drainage works to mitigate future flood events in the Village. WWTas are doing a wonderful job and we look forward to the completion of the works over the next couple of months. Council appreciates the support of the Broadmarsh & Elderslie Progress Association and the local Community in the development of this project.



Improved access—Victoria Memorial Hall—Kempton

Works have commenced at the Kempton Memorial Hall which will see reinstatement of the entry verandah (as per photograph below), together with improved access and egress to the Hall building.

Landscaping and paving will also be undertaken to create an appealing and multi-purpose building forecourt. This project is an outcome of Council working in conjunction with the Town Streetscape Committee, which consists of representatives from the various organisations within Kempton.

The benefits of Home Composting

Around half of our household garbage is made up of food and garden waste. Composting instead of putting this waste in your rubbish bin stops it from going to landfill and creates a useful product instead. Compost improves your soil structure and nutrient levels and holds moisture in your soil so it saves on watering.

Composting accelerates the natural process of decomposition to convert organic waste matter into a nutrient-rich soil you can use on your garden. Composting can be the perfect solution for most garden waste and food scraps that cannot be eaten.

How to compost

Choose a shady spot in your garden to start your compost heap or to put your compost bin; Add to your compost in layers of food scraps, garden clippings and paper; Keep your compost moist, but not wet, and aerate it about once a week; When your compost is dark and crumbly dig it into your garden or spread it on top as mulch.

What to put in your compost

Daily (nitrogen rich) bread (please note: bread may attract mice) egg shells fresh grass clippings human and animal hair manure old newspapers (wet) sawdust (not from treated timber) and wood ash tea leaves, tea bags and coffee grounds used vegetable cooking oil vacuum cleaner dust Weeds vegetable and fruit peelings and scraps

Weekly (carbon rich)

bark cane mulch dry grass clippings dry leaves egg cartons hay paper shredded paper and cardboard straw tree pruning's Other useful ingredient

Other useful ingredients

What to do with your compost

wood ash Avoid the following items to keep your compost healthy. bread or cake (may attract mice) dairy products diseased plant material fat large branches magazines meat scraps and bones (Bokashi bins can accept these) metals, plastic and glass

pet droppings

blood and bone

dolomite

lime

Compost troubleshooting

- **Smelly** = too wet, not enough air, too acidic Solution = add dry material, turn heap, add lime
- **Slow** = not enough air, no active ingredients
- Solution = turn heap, add water, add manure
- **Maggots** = faeces, seafood, meats, fats Solution = cover with lime or soil
- Vermin = breads, grains, too dry Solution = remove, cover entry with wire, turn

The type of composting option you choose will affect the time it takes to produce some great compost you can use on plants and gardens, mixed with soil or as mulch. If you don't have a garden, try mixing compost with soil in pot plants.

Better Bus Services for Tasmania

Simpler, faster and more frequent intercity bus services for Tasmania are now here.

Services between Devonport and Launceston/Hobart have increased. There are now 6 services a day on weekdays and 4 a day on Saturday and Sundays.

The new North West Express goes from Burnie to Devonport via Ulverstone and Penguin. It travels hourly, 7 days a week. This means your appointments can be more flexible and you have more travel options. You can travel when you need to because there are 30 services a week in each direction, which is 19 more than before.

Kempton Allied Health Community Centre

The former Principal's Residence at the Kempton Primary School has now been transformed into a modern allied health medical and community Centre. It also includes a new staff room for the school. This project has been supported by the State Government through funding from the Department of Communities.

The Centre is basically at the final 'sign-off' stage with all renovation and buildings works completed and only some minor access and car park works to be undertaken. Basic landscaping will then follow. During the development period, Council has been consulting with a number of potential service providers and these discussions can now be progressed given that the facility will be available in the short term.

In relation to services, whilst the aim is to provide a range of allied health services, at this stage it has not been possible to attract a General Practitioner. This continues to be an objective going forward. Furniture and fit-out of the facility will also be ongoing as items are identified and the need arises.
