And finally the launch of the Tunnack History Book on the following Sunday at Tunnack, with over three hundred people in attendance. It is a fine book with a wealth of information about the village of Tunnack. I would like to congratulate all of those involved in the contributions and the writing of this fine volume.

"Regional Tasmania – *keep it alive*" this is the campaign theme of Southern Midlands Council along with ten other Councils who have banded together to ensure that the State Government as well as the Australian Government understands the impact of their respective decision making on rural Communities like ours.

### For example

 the demise of the forestry industries is a graphic example of a great resource industry that has been brought to its knees Forestry in the Southern Midlands Region is a vital resource industry providing both local employment and significant economic activity;

- the winding up of the timber giant Gunns Pty Ltd, by and large through the Inter-Governmental Agreement (the IGA). Gunns was a proud Company that has supported rural Tasmania since 1875. Their demise will have considerable impact both from an employment and economic view point from our Council area and we are yet to feel the full impact of that company failure. This company had extensive plantations in Southern Midlands and was a large ratepayer of plantation land;
- the IGA signed by the Prime Minister Julia Gillard and Tasmanian Premier Lara Giddings on 7 August 2011 purports to be a landmark agreement that will provide certainty for Tasmania's forestry industry, support local jobs and communities, and protect more of Tasmania's high conservation value forests. There are many in our Community that would question this statement;
- the recent reduction on policing, where we have seen two police officers at Oatlands being made redundant along with one at Kempton. One of the Oatlands officers will not be replaced. The massive geographical area of the Southern Midlands and the Central Highlands together now has only five police officers to service the area;

 other very important economic industries are also found to be under siege recently including the mining, aquaculture, tourism, agriculture, and agricultural related industries all of which are drivers of Tasmanian sustainability;

### Stonemason Apprentice Wins First Year Apprentice Award

Heritage Building Solutions stonemason apprentice, Simon Bryant, was recently awarded Best First Year Stonemason Apprentice by Holmesglenn TAFE (Vic), one of the largest providers of vocational education. Through his apprenticeship, Simon has already worked on some high-profile, historic properties such as the Oatlands Gaol, Kempton Watch House and Port Arthur (where stone repairs on the Penitentiary chimneys had Simon and Rob working 16 metres above the ground). The variety of work also appeals to Simon. "You're moving around all the time and no two jobs are the same," he said.

As an initiative of the Southern Midlands Council, the Centre for Heritage, which incorporates Heritage Building Solutions, is an important contributor to the passing on of heritage trade skills into the future. Centre for Heritage Director, Martin Farley, says that apprentices such as Simon are vitally important to the continuation of traditional heritage skills. "The trade skills and, more importantly, the knowledge required for the restoration and maintenance of historic buildings are more specialised than those required for mainstream building work," he said. "It takes considerable time and appropriate on-the-job training to attain the necessary level of skill. Currently, opportunities and incentives to undertake such training are declining."

Through the Centre for Heritage, Southern Midlands Council is aiming to pass on as much knowledge as possible to the future generations by employing apprentices and utilising its own heritage assets as a part of this.

### Man's Best Friend - not necessarily your neighbour's best friend



Many dogs throughout the Southern Midlands continue to cause varying degrees of tension in our villages. The Southern Midlands Council is committed to encouraging the responsible ownership of dogs. To achieve this Council is required under legislation to enforce its responsibilities set out in the Dog Control Act 2000 as well as the Dog Control Amendment Act 2009 and abide by its commitments set out in its own Dog Management Policy 2011.

Within its Dog Management Policy 2011, Council has a *Code of Responsible Dog Ownership*, with the objective of aligning the responsibilities of dog ownership with acceptable Community expectations, designed to encourage a compatible relationship between dog owners and non-dog owners.

The Code states that it is the responsibility of every dog owner whilst in the municipal area of Southern Midlands to:

- Ensure that the dog is registered and that registration is maintained, as well as ensuring that the dog is micro chipped in accordance with the Dog Control Act 2000;
- Ensure that the dog is kept under effective control at all times and not allowing a dog to be at large;
- Ensuring that the dog is collared and on a lead in public places and that it is properly restrained when in or on a vehicle;
- Ensure that the dog does not cause a nuisance to any other person, whether by persistent or loud barking, howling or by any other means;
- Ensure that the dog does not injure, endanger, intimidate, or otherwise cause distress to any Person.

An owner is responsible for the actions of a dog;

- Ensure that the dog does not damage or endanger any property belonging to any other persons;
- Ensure that dogs are not allowed to roam unsupervised;
- \* Take all reasonable steps to ensure that the dog does not injure, endan ger, or cause distress to any livestock, poultry, domestic animal, or protected wildlife:
- Ensure that the dog receives proper care and attention and is supplied with proper and sufficient food, water and shelter;
- Ensure that the welfare of the dog is protected as required by the Animal Welfare Act 1993;
- Ensure that the dog receives adequate exercise; and
- Clean up after the dog should it defecate in a public place and dispose of waste in a responsible way.

An owner can be held liable for the actions of a dog and can be fined or penalised for dog control offences. Owners can also be liable to pay compensation for injury or damage caused by a dog in their charge. An owner's failure to properly control a dog may in some circumstances result in the dog being destroyed.

It is a minority group of irresponsible dog owners that make it necessary to have legislation in place to govern the keeping of dogs in our Community. Council is committed to maintaining Community standards by means of positive education, open discussion between parties, mediation, and wherever possible to work through acceptable solutions, even though this may take some time. However, at times it is necessary to instigate legal proceedings to change some people's attitudes and unacceptable behaviour. Council is equally committed to "Education by Prosecution" if required. On its web site Council has information in respect of animal management and the Community are invited to visit the site www.southernmidlands.tas.gov.au/animalmanagement/.
