

Mayors Report

An announcement that the Midlands Irrigation Scheme will proceed was made by the Premier (Hon Lara Giddings MP) and the Minister for Infrastructure, Energy & Resources (Hon David O'Byrne MP) on December 17th 2011. The Premier advised that the remaining State & local Government approvals that are required are at an advanced stage and that a

two-year construction period is anticipated to start in April next year. When completed this will be one of the most significant projects ever to be undertaken in the Southern Midlands and it follows several years of public consultation and planning.

From a Community perspective it is appropriate to acknowledge and thank the State Government for their drive along with their commitment to part fund the scheme as well as supporting the Tasmanian Irrigation Development Board in designing and developing irrigation schemes throughout Tasmania.

As we all know, the Midlands has suffered from droughts over many previous decades. This has limited the diversity of agricultural activities given the lack of a guaranteed supply of water.

New, high value and emerging horticultural, along with dairy enterprises can be considered when the water flows. Current cropping of poppies and potatoes will be able to be enhanced through a guaranteed source of irrigation water.

All of the "flow on" economic benefit to our local rural communities will be welcomed when the scheme is operational. Additional employment opportunities that such a project brings would strengthen our local communities and provide significant benefit to the whole of the Southern Midlands. The Coal River Valley is an excellent example of what can evolve through the introduction of a well considered irrigation system.

I am sure that all ratepayers in the Southern Midlands will be personally excited by Government's announcement.

Fire Hazards

I wish to reiterate to all property owners the importance of reducing their vegetation and growth around their houses and buildings. Should all this wonderful growth dry off in late January or February then we will be faced with an extreme fire hazard situation.

While our volunteer rural fire fighters do a magnificent job in protecting our homes and properties, they can be assisted by all property owners slashing and mowing areas around buildings and within their back yards.

Your cooperation would be greatly appreciated.

Year Ahead

The Year ahead will provide many challenges for Southern Midlands Council.

Rural roads have been severely impacted by the recent two wet winters and Council staff are still repairing damage to roads and bridges from the winter and spring flooding.

Issue 1 January 2012

Recently a tender has been accepted to reconstruct and seal parts of the Stonor Road, Huntingdon Tier Road Dysart and Union Street Campania. Repairs to the York Plains road will also be undertaken early in the New Year. Also a major new bridge over the Jordon River at Broadmarsh is under construction. We certainly have a busy work schedule ahead.

Dulverton Walking Track – Oatlands to Parattah

The Dulverton Walking Track is completed at last! The 7 Km track goes between Oatlands and Parattah townships and mostly follows the old rail line route. The initial Oatlands section of the track follows the edge of Lake Dulverton and begins just near the exercise equipment on the foreshore, opposite the school grounds. The track passes through Crown land and seven parcels of privately owned land. Work on the track began back in 1995 with a group of volunteers planting some native trees on a section of the rail formation, beside Tunnack Road, just past the 'Bellevue' property. Since that time, literally 1000s of volunteer hours have gone into developing the track, bit by bit each year. Works by dedicated community volunteers and groups have involved tree planting; tree maintenance; weed control; placement of gravel using spades, rakes and wheel barrows; constructing pathways and restoration of bridge decking at two sandstone culvert crossings. The final construction stages of the track involved machinery work to handle larger projects that had been on hold due to funding constraints. The Southern Midlands Council applied and received funding from the Australian and State Governments in 2011. The final sections of the track were completed in early December, some 16 years after it all began!! Walkers, joggers, push bike riders, horse riders and people exercising their dogs are now regularly using the track (no motor bikes are allowed!). A free walkway brochure detailing points of interest is available at the Tourism Centre at Callington Mill. An official opening of the track will be held some time early in 2012.

Please do not release domestic ducks and geese at Lake Dulverton. The lake is a classified as a Conservation Area by Parks & Wildlife and is reserved for wildlife. Domestic duck and geese species are periodically removed from the lake, and it is not always possible to find another home for them.

Make Sure your pool is child-safe!



There is no better way to enjoy a summer's day than swimming.

The majority of drownings in private swimming pools involve children under 5 years of age.

Pool owners should ensure they have safety fences and gates that comply with the relevant Australian Standard (AS 1926.1).

A permit should be obtained from Council if a new pool is to be constructed.

The minimum requirements for pool fencing are as follows:

Fences

Fences and gates must be at least 1.2m high with a bottom clearance of no more than 100mm. Any horizontal rails should be inside the fence, and a least 900mm apart, and any vertical rails must not be more than 100mm apart.

Access Gates and Doors

Gates/doors must only open outwards, must automatically close and lock (ie: be self closing without the use of force), and not be able to be opened, except by operating the latch.

The release latch to open the gate/door must be at least 1.5m above the ground (or be mounted on the inside of the gate/door, and then special conditions apply).

Windows

Windows that look onto the pool area must be either totally covered by bars that are no more than 105mm apart, or, not be able to be opened more than 105mm, by the use of chains etc.

Pools should be situated in an area to permit easy viewing from as many vantage points as possible within the property, to enable supervision of pool users.

Pool fencing should never be used as a substitute for adult supervision, and whilst compliant fencing can restrict the access of young children to a pool, adult supervision is essential wherever young children are in a pool.

Future Climate Profile for the Southern Midlands

Tasmania is fortunate to have had the highest resolution climate modeling conducted in Australia. The recently completed Climate Futures for Tasmania project provides a sound knowledge base for identifying climate related risks at a local level. Climate Futures for Tasmania prepared a detailed report specifically for Southern Midlands Council (available on the SMC web site shortly). The material provided below is a summary of key points from the report. Current climate and recent trends

Southern Midlands has a temperate, maritime climate across the southeast half of the municipality with inland and elevated areas experiencing very cold winters and numerous frosts. Long-term average temperatures have risen in the decades since the 1950s, at a rate of up to 0.1 °C per decade.

The average annual rainfall across the municipality is highly variable ranging from as low as 450 mm in the rainshadow area (through the centre of the municipality) to greater than 700 mm towards the east coast, and in the highlands in the west. There has been a decline in average annual rainfall since the mid 1970s, and this decline has been strongest in autumn.

The influence of large-scale climate drivers on the local climate has been evident in recent years with the 'big dry' of 1995-2009 coinciding with a predominant 'El Nino' pattern, and recent wet years coinciding with a predominant 'La Nina' pattern.

Extreme events

The changes in climate that are most likely to impact upon council's infrastructure, roads, and the local community and environment is a magnification in intensity of extreme events:

The temperature of very hot days to increase by up to 3°C.

Warm spells (days in a row where temperatures are in the top 5% of recorded temperatures) currently last around 5 days. These may double in duration i.e. increase by up to 5 days.

Extended heat waves and more extreme temperatures are likely to enhance the occurrence and intensity of bushfires.

Rainfall will trend towards heavier events, interspersed by longer dry periods. High daily runoff events are likely to increase, including those that may lead to erosion or flooding. Rainfall volume in a 200-year average recurrence interval (ARI) event will increase by up to 25 %.
