



The Southern Midlands municipality has been well supported by State Government services in the past with schools, policing and hospital services i.e. the Midlands Multi Purpose Health Centre.

Regrettably, these services are coming under increased scrutiny with a view to either reduce or remove some of these services due to the State Government's severe budget problems.

It is even more regrettable that the reduction (or possible removal) of these services are occurring within rural and regional areas of Tasmania, and not so much in urban areas. The impact is indeed disproportionate.

The immediate concern is the State Government's announcement that many public schools will be forced to close if they fail a strict viability and sustainability test which has been proposed by the State Minister for Education and Skills, the Hon Nick McKim MP. This test has been developed by the School Viability Reference Group, set up as an advisory body to the Minister. Each school will have to self assess against a number of set criteria.

As a further impost upon these schools, the self assessment process will be on an annual basis and therefore use valuable time and resources of the schools, and continue the uncertainty and trauma of this ongoing saga. The Southern Midlands Council is most concerned that any of our two High Schools and three Primary Schools are potentially "in the firing line" for closure.

Your Council has responded in a very positive manner to this threat of school closures by establishing a Southern Midlands School Reference Group. This group includes representatives (Principals and School Association Presidents) from the five schools in the Southern Midlands Council area.

In November last year we made a presentation to the Ministerial School Viability Reference Group in Hobart where all the Southern Midlands Schools were represented. Since that time the report has been released and we can take <u>no comfort</u> from its findings and recommendations. The report did take on board some of our submissions and recommendations but the report overall gave <u>little or no recognition</u> to the fact that rural schools have a vital and pivotal role in those communities. To close schools would "rip the heart" out of any regional community.

and encourage people to come and live and raise a family in a rural area without a local school? It is difficult in itself to entice people to leave urban areas or come and live and enjoy a rural lifestyle, but without a local school it would be almost impossible.

The Southern Midlands Council has committed considerable resources to this campaign by way of engaging a consultant, Mr Martin Farley, to assist in building our case and developing a positive response to the report.

Your Council is committed to ensuring that we do whatever is within our power and influence to keep all the public schools open in Southern Midlands. Your support, however made, will be most welcome to our campaign.

Free e-waste recycling for the Tasmanian Public









Do you have an old TV, computer, mobile phone, stereo, games console, etc? If so then you should be aware that the Tasmanian e-waste recycling event will occur on the weekend of the 17th and 18th March 2012. This important event will help divert e-waste from landfill and allow it to be dismantled, reprocessed and then used in the manufacture of new products.

The two sites in Southern Tasmania accepting

e-waste on the 17th (Saturday) and 18th (Sunday) March 2012 are:

Glenorchy: Royal Show Grounds overflow car park; corner of Brooker Highway and Goodwood Road, Glenorchy

(ie: opposite the Show Grounds); and

Kingston: Old Kingston High School car park; corner of Channel Highway and Freeman Street, Kingston.

The following types of

e-waste WILL be accepted:

- Entertainment equipment, including TV's (screens must not be broken), video recorders, DVD players, HI-FI equipment and stereos, digital cameras, video cameras;
- Computer equipment including PC's, laptops, monitors, mice, keyboards, cables, drives, and computer related peripherals;
- Home office equipment including printers, scanners and toners:
- ✓ Mobile phone handsets and chargers; and
- ✓ Electronic game consoles and accessories.

The following types of

e-waste WILL NOT be accepted:

- Whitegoods, ovens, cooktops, vacuum cleaners, microwave ovens and other kitchen and household appliances;
- UPS units (uninterruptible power supplies), overhead projectors,
- Batteries except for computer batteries;
- Fluorescent lighting tubes and light "bulbs";
- Any contaminated equipment or any type of hazardous waste.

Three other sites will also be operating around the state on the 17th and 18th of March, at: Launceston, Ulverstone and Burnie.

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Department of Justice & Workplace Standards

Advice to Owners and Occupiers of Commercial, Industrial and Public Buildings

Maintaining Essential Safety Features in Buildings – Are You Complying with the Law?

The *Building Act 2000* requires owners of **commercial, industrial and public buildings** to maintain the essential safety and health features and measures in their buildings. To comply, owners must arrange for regular inspections and maintenance of the safety features of the property. They must also display a certificate (a Form 56 Annual Maintenance Statement) on their premises.

Since 14 July 2006 all owners or occupiers have been required to display an annual Maintenance Statement near the entrance or in a similar prominent position in their building. For many owners the statement will shortly be due for its annual replacement.

- Before the statement is replaced the owner should ensure that all safety features are in working order.
- Failure to undertake the mandatory maintenance and to display the Annual Statement is an offence, and may also void the owner's insurance policy.

Buildings affected include:

- all shops, offices, factories, schools, blocks of flats or apartments, hotels and nightclubs, cafés, tourist accommodation; and
- all workplaces or buildings where the public has access;

Essential safety and health features and measures include (but are not limited to):

- fire and smoke detectors, fire fighting equipment;
- exit doors and exit signs, emergency lighting, fire escapes;
- · smoke alarms and warning systems; and
- emergency evacuation plans
- This does not include ordinary residential dwellings.

If you are unsure about whether the laws apply to your building, or have any enquiries about how to comply with your maintenance obligations, please contact Council's building department.

Council's Recycling and Garbage Collection Service

Council offers a weekly or fortnightly recycling and garbage collection service to most parts of the Southern Midlands.

The garbage collection service uses mobile garbage bins (MGBs) or wheelie bins. All waste that cannot be recycled should be disposed of into the wheelie bin which then should be placed at the kerb/roadside, with the wheels inwards, on the night before collection day.

Council's recycling collection service uses an open crate, and although some other Councils now use wheelie bins for their recycling service, it is considered that at this time, the recycling service using the crate represents value for money for ratepayers and the Council, whilst providing a good quality service.

The following items are able to be recycled:







- ✓ Glass Containers
- ✓ Aluminium Cans;
- ✓ Steel Cans;

- ✓ Milk and Juice Cartons (liquid paperboard);
- ✓ Plastic Bottles;
- ✓ Paper and Cardboard ("bundled/tied").

All containers should be rinsed, and the recycling crate should be placed out for collection, beside the wheelie bin, on the evening before collection day.

To reduce the likelihood of recyclable items being blown out of recycling crates, the following advice is provided to users of Council's kerbside recycling service:

- ✓ Ensure newspaper, cardboard, etc. is tied/bundled together;
- Ensure lightweight items such as plastic bottles are placed at the bottom of the crate, with heavier items (eg: glass containers) on top, so as to reduce the likelihood of items blowing out of the recycling crate: and
- Squash aluminium cans so that as well as taking up less room and reducing the likelihood of items overflowing, that they are more compact and thus less likely to be blown around.

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CLIMATE CHANGE LOTS OF SMALL ACTIONS WILL MAKE A DIFFERENCE

climate change can often seem frustratingly slow given the urgency of the threat. Slowness or reluctance to take personal action on climate change can be for a number of reasons including:

- Being unsure of the facts on climate change. There is often not a clear and consistent channel of information from scientists to the community. Facts can often be lost in translation through the media cycle or conflicting political agendas.
- Complacency a sense that the problem is elsewhere or some time in the future and that others will solve the problem anyway.
- Fear of change the scale of the problem and its potential local effects can be overwhelming. This can lead to a sense of denial that there is a problem.
- Powerlessness feeling that personal actions are unimportant, insignificant or will make no difference.

Part of Southern Midlands Council's approach to climate change is to address the barriers people may have to taking action by providing information through community meetings, supporting residents in energy

Personal and community action to address the threat of efficiency projects, and offering incentives to begin the process of change.

> Despite these initiatives, how do we track how we are progressing as a community and how do we engage more people in taking action? The 'One Person Can' project can help. By logging on to the web site www.onepersoncan.org and taking the 'One Person Can' survey we can get a better picture of how many people across the Southern Midlands, across the State or across the country, are getting involved in a broad range of actions, small and large, to tackle climate change.

> The 'One Person Can' project highlights that individual actions, no matter how small, can amount to something collectively significant and importantly foster a sense that you are not acting in isolation.


